Coldwells Building Company Ltd won the award for a sensitive refurbishment in Aberdeenshire.

Project overview

The site was a nealected shambles of croft buildings, but had huge potential. Located between a pine forest and open fields, the spacious new kitchen granite cottage and neighbouring byre were built in 1869 and clumsily connected by a slateclad extension in the 1970s. The task was to strip and refurbish the cottage and byre for the new homeowners and add a modern extension of timber and glass.

Key features and/or highlights

To add lightness to the cottage, which is over 150 years old, the team carved

openings into the granite walls and

introduced expansive glazing to illuminate the home and showcase the views.

The team's joiners customised

birch cabinetry to run the length of the entrance hallway, providing storage and a bench to sit on when removing boots after a forest walk.

A windowless bathroom along the hallway needed light, so the team positioned a 250kg frameless skylight above the walk-in shower and bath. Charred larch, prepared through a traditional Japanese technique, 'Shou Sugi Ban', makes a unique bathroom feature wall

The floors of the original cottage were stripped out to create a single practical and spacious, open-plan kitchen and living area.

The byre was converted into two large bedrooms, and the extension, clad in black Siberian larch, now houses a large living room and master suite.

Major challenges to overcome

 The 150-year-old byre needed to be converted into bedrooms but the wall heads were off level, the wall plates were rotten, and some of the rafters had woodworm.

- To cost-effectively repair the byre roof, the team salvaged some of the healthy rafters, treated them for woodworm and re-purposed them to build a new roof.
- Drainage was an issue too. Water pooled in the courtyard, threatening damage so the team installed a new land drain in front of the drystone dyke near the property.
- The team used a self-levelling compound and a liquid damp-proof membrane to level the cottage's kitchen floor, which was 45mm out, before laying new timber flooring.
